She then took up nurse's training at the sanitarium at Wichita, Kan., graduating Oct. 4, 1915. For a while she practiced nursing at Newton, Ia., then, in 1916, she came to Wyoming and nursed for Dr. Croft at Cowley.

Highly interested in missionary work, she was appointed Wyoming state Bible worker by her church, and while engaged in this work she met Marion L. Ainsworth in the spring of 1919. On Aug. 27, 1919, they were married, and came to Big Trails, where they made their home. One daughter, Erma, now Mrs. Frank Chamberlain of Worland, was born to them.
