



ALBERT W ANDERSON
1856-1940

Albert W Anderson was born April 7, 1856 in Reddick, Lewis County, Missouri, the son of Samuel W (born in Ohio) and Elizabeth (born in Ohio). In the 1880 Federal Census he was still unmarried, but by 1900 his wife, Hettie L and he had been married 16 years and lived in Labella, Lewis County, Missouri, making his marriage to Hettie approximately 1884. (It is safe to assume that he was married in Missouri, as well.) By this time, had a son Rainie (*Rouse* as Ten Sleep residents know him indicating *the indexer misread the census*). His son was 7 years old and born in 1893. There were two sisters: Mattie and Isa Anderson.

In 1910 Rouse (then 17) lived in Highland, Lewis, MO and in 1920, Rouse (27) was listed on the Election District #3, Washakie County as a single man. His parents were still living in Highland, Lewis County, MO. The Federal Census for 1930 indicates that Albert Anderson (Albert W) is widowed and still living in Highland, Lewis County, MO.

Albert's son, Rouse W Anderson, had been living in Wyoming and specifically in Washakie County for 20 years by 1940. According to Gene Anderson, son of Rouse, Rouse went to Missouri and brought his father to Ten Sleep where he passed away on the 26 July 1940.

Services Held Sunday For A. W. Anderson

Funeral services were conducted Sunday at 2 p. m. for Albert Wellington Anderson, 84, of Ewing, Mo., who died at the home of his son, Rouse W. Anderson, near Tensleep Friday.

Services at the Anderson home were in charge of Rev. John H. Clark of Liberty, Mo. Interment was in the Tensleep cemetery. Pallbearers were Estes Woods, Paul Frison, Roy Shriver, George Brown, Art Smith and Bert Arnold.

Anderson was born April 7, 1856 near LaBell, Mo., the son of Samuel and Elizabeth Norris Anderson. He was married Feb. 28, 1884 to Hettie Louisa Rouse, who died March 20, 1925. The couple had four children, three daughters and one son.

He was a member of the Mt. Salem Baptist church in Lewis county, Mo., later moving his membership to the Gilead Baptist church near Ewing, Mo. His entire life, with the exception of three years in which he lived in Kansas, was spent in Lewis county. He came to Worland last December.

Surviving him are his daughters, Mrs. Charles S. Wallace and Mrs. Cecil D. Black of Worland and Rouse Anderson and their families and two sisters, Mrs. Emma Squires and Eva Potter of Attica, Kans. His surviving grandchildren are Harry and Mary Louise Wallace, Dale and James Black and Bob, Gene, Shirley, Sally and Jim Anderson.
