SHERIDAN — Former Thermopolis and Ten Sleep resident Glenn Cleveland Cantleberry, 70, died Saturday, Feb. 25, at the V.A. Medical Center in Sheridan.

He was born Sept. 30, 1924 in Lander, a son of Neal and Ida Henderson Cantleberry.

He served in the U.S. Army in the European Theater during World War II, at Normandy, in northern France, in the Ardennes, the Rhineland and in Central Europe. He received four medals, including the Good Conduct Medal.

After the war, Mr. Cantleberry moved to Thermopolis, where he owned and operated Glenn's Plumbing and Heating.

On Aug. 3, 1946, he married Marjorie Sweet in Laurel, Mont.

In 1963, he purchased the Big Horn Bar from his father-in-law Roy Sweet, and the family moved to Ten Sleep. After selling the bar, he continued working as a plumber in Ten Sleep.

He was a lifetime member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and a member of Elks Lodge No. 1746 in Thermopolis.

He enjoyed hunting, fishing, the outdoors, going to rodeos, reading, and helping neighbors with branding, trailing cows, or just providing a helping hand.

Survivors include his wife of Ten Sleep; a son, Glenn Jr. of Sheridan; a daughter, Judy Weekes of Dillon, Mont.; two sisters, Alice Todorovich of Thermopolis and Iva Mae Simp-

son of Yucca Valley, Calif.; and four grandchildren, Sheri Lynn and Jeremy Lee of Casper, Roxanne Weekes Beasley of Minot, N.D., and Damon Paul Adams of Dillon.

He was preceded in death by his parents; four sisters, Fern Bolinger, Ella Lockhart, Gladys McKenner and Donna Dunkin; and a brother, John L. Cantleberry.

Cremation has taken place, and the ashes will be buried at a private family service at the Ten Sleep Cemetery.
