Fred Harvard, Wyoming Resident Since 1896, Dies At Ranch Home Wednesday

Fred Harvard, 51, a Big Horn basin resident since 1896, died at his ranch home near Black mountain Wednesday morning following a brief illness.

He had been suffering from influenza for a couple of weeks. Last week he went to Billings for medical treatment, returning Sunday. He had continued to work, however, and Wednesday morning after arising and building a fire in the house, he suffered a heart attack from which he died within a short time. During his illness he had been cared for by Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Compton, who were employed on the ranch, and they were with him when he died.

Harvard was born at Long Pine, Neb., Aug. 28, 1891. When he was five years old his parents moved to the Big Horn basin where he had lived since. His ranch lies at the head of Nowater creek.
